## HANDMAIDS SERVE SJV

While much of a man's formation and experience at SJV are built around brotherhood, there is a need for a little sisterhood as well.

For the past few years, the priest staff have prayed about how to incorporate this into the SJV formation program. Father Becker started a conversation with Mother Mary Clare Roufs, foundress of the Handmaids of the Heart of Jesus, and prayers were eventually answered when two Handmaids joined the SJV staff this year.

Every Tuesday, Sister Anna and Sister Margaret Joy are at SJV ready to serve. Sister Anna, who has her master's degree in Religious Education, teaches the SJV men how to teach the faith and analyzes their teaching styles. Sister Margaret Joy supports the administrative staff. Both attend midday Mass and lead afternoon Rosary.

"They bring into our house what St. John Paul II called a 'feminine genius', " Father Becker says. "The joy barometer goes straight up when they are here."

Mother Mary Clare and five other women were part of the community when the Handmaids were officially established in 2010. Currently there are 30 sisters in the order, 21 of whom live at the Motherhouse in New Ulm, and nine other professed sisters reside in either Duluth or Hopkins. Of those who live at the Motherhouse, six novices and six postulants are in formation.

The order's charism is to live in imitation of Mary as handmaid, virgin, bride, and mother in the diocesan life of the Church, carrying out the New Evangelization in parishes.



While SJV is not a parish, the seminarians serve local parishes by teaching religious education and will one day serve their parishes as ordained priests or lay leaders.

Most importantly, the Handmaids provide a "ministry of presence" at SJV, as articulated by their apostolic vision: The most important aspect of our apostolic life in the diocese is the resounding witness of our consecrated presence, for 'what counts most is not what religious do, but who they are as persons consecrated to the Lord.'

"The motherly dimension of the Church is essential for the spiritual life and is particularly present with the religious sisters," said Christian Stiles, a seminarian from the Diocese of Lansing. "I have come to know Sister Anna this past year as a beautiful example of this dimension."



When you walk into Father Becker's office, you know you are encountering a unique, profound man. Walls are lined with books, a bicycle rests alongside the desk, icons of Jesus hang on the wall, taped-up reading glasses rest on the table, and two mounted bucks in the right and left corners of the office meet your gaze.

There are several reasons Father Becker has made a great Rector over the years, but one quality stands out: his confidence and freedom to be himself. Whether he is telling an "Ole and Sven" joke, giving a passionate homily at Last Chance Mass, or entering into a deep, prayerful silence, Father Becker's genuine, humble leadership is evident.

The freedom to be his own man comes from a confident knowledge of the Father's love

for him. And when you walk around SJV, you see the same trust in God's love instilled in the seminarians. "Father Becker affirms you and gives you a spirit of joy and peace in who you are," said Zachary Ochsenbauer, a senior from the Archdiocese of Saint Paul and Minneapolis.

Although it feels like home today, Father Becker never expected to be the Rector at SJV. His previous assignment at St. Michael's Catholic Church in St. Michael, Minnesota, was where he met Bill Malkowiak, a transplant from New Jersey. Malkowiak immediately saw something unique in his new parish leader and friend: "Father Becker has a special gift in connecting with people and encouraging men to engage in the community."

Father Becker played in the parish basketball league, regularly hunted with parishioners, and even showed up for Malkowiak's son's playoff baseball game to cheer him on.

"He engaged in very visible areas to make connections with men, with an awareness that it would engage the broader faith community," Malkowiak said. These God-given gifts would one day make Father Becker an ideal Rector of a college seminary.

This became a reality in 2009 when Father Becker received a call from the Chancery. "A call from the Chancery was not always a good sign for a Pastor," Father Becker said with a laugh. Father Becker was asked to serve as a Spiritual Formator at SJV. "I loved the people at St. Michael's so much, and I wanted to stay," he said. "But I desired to do God's will."

After shedding good-bye tears with his beloved parishioners, Becker packed his bags to serve under Rector Father William Baer.

"SJV was active, busy, and cutting-edge," Becker recalled. "If Father Baer had an open night, he would start a new ministry of outreach." He also noticed a trait of his predecessor: Father Baer would have prepared 20 percent of a talk to give in front of hundreds of people, and he would finish the next 80 percent on the spot. "Father Baer had a certain brilliance about him," he fondly remembered. "His talks were so entertaining."

Most importantly, Becker saw that Father Baer challenged the seminarians to rise to a great ideal that included 6:00 a.m. Morning Prayer, 40-hours of classwork, daily Mass, and pastoral outreach most nights. "It was an ideal so great that the seminarians had to rely on God for help," Becker said.

After one year as a Formator, Father Becker was asked to become the eighth Rector of SJV. "I just tweaked Father Baer's agenda a little bit," Becker said. "I wanted to allow a little more room for contemplative life so guys could process their vocational call."

One of those seminarians was Stephen Durkee who began at SJV during Father Becker's first year. One day, Durkee challenged the new Rector to a one-on-one basketball game.

Becker said to him just before his ordination: "You are going to be one beloved priest because you have the faith, prayer life, social skills, good humor and humility that attracts. I love you, too, my son and brother. Now, go convert some youth!"

During Father Becker's tenure, more than 500 seminarians were in formation at SJV. They have gone on to serve in a myriad of ways, including as priests, fathers, dentists, missionaries, lawyers, and teachers. SJV continued to grow and thrive as one of the largest college seminaries in the country under Father Becker's leadership.

Although the job was a lot of work at times, it was balanced by the way in which the seminarians brought fun and joy into his days. When asked about his favorite memory, Father Becker laughed and recalled the time a seminarian dressed up as Pope Francis. His brother seminarians drove him around campus in a "Popemobile" waving Vatican flags and singing to celebrate Francis' election to the papacy.

"I had a big smile. I loved their zeal and pride for the Church," Father Becker said.


Looking back on his time at SJV, Father Becker has seen the maturity and growth in holiness in so many men, himself included. "I am more abandoned to God's will," Father Becker said. "Early on, I wanted everyone to be priests, even men whom God was not calling to that vocation. Over time, I allowed Jesus to call the shots. When a man is called to marriage, I rejoice."

To his surprise, Father Becker agreed. The matchup drew a crowd of seminarians and a lot of excitement. "Becker ended up winning," Durkee said, "But it was very close." Moving forward, the two played pick-up basketball once a month.

For the next four years, Becker became an important figure in Durkee's journey to the priesthood. He checked in on Durkee frequently and encouraged him to grow in holiness. "In seminary, it makes a big difference when a priest asks you to grow up in a loving, fatherly way," Father Durkee said. "Father Becker wanted what was best for me."

Ordained in 2017, Father Durkee is now the Director of Priestly Vocations for the Diocese of Grand Rapids, Michigan, and sends his seminarians to SJV. He has a tradition of inserting quotes in his Bible from important people in his life. One of them is what Father

As his leadership style grew, Father Becker also became more comfortable asking for help along the way. That meant assigning staff priests to areas where he thought they would excel and asking seniors to take on leadership roles in guiding the new men.

Most importantly, Father Becker grew in gratitude to his Heavenly Father. "I am grateful to God for His loving grace and the adventure of ministering with and through Jesus," he said.

As Father Becker completes his final weeks as Rector, he has one desire for his legacy: "I hope that when history looks back on this time, they will say holy saints were born at Saint John Vianney College Seminary."

Next, Father Becker will begin a well-deserved sabbatical to finish a book he is writing, entitled *To Fulfill All Righteousness*.

Although his office will be emptied of the books, bike, icons, broken glasses, and bucks, the culture, legacy, and joy Father Becker showed to so many people will live on for generations.



On January 22, Father Jonathan "Jon" Kelly, formator and spiritual director, received a phone call from Archbishop Bernard Hebda informing him that he had been chosen to serve as the ninth Rector of SJV. Father Kelly thanked the Archbishop and the Lord for this new opportunity before slipping into the barber chair to get his hair cut.

The poignant and the mundane. Father Kelly smiled.

"God chooses us for particular times," Kelly said. "I am confident that He will help me and the priests at SJV to respond generously and courageously at this time."

Father Kelly succeeds Father Michael Becker who concludes his tenure as Rector at the end of May.

#### In the Beginning

Baby Jonathan took his place in the Kelly family in 1973 behind five sisters and one brother. His parents, Richard and Mary, raised their family in the Diocese of New Ulm in Southern Minnesota. His father was an attorney and a judge; Mom was a homemaker. Spare time was spent together on the family's hobby farm.

Kelly went to Catholic grade school through fourth grade and attended public and private schools until he transferred to Georgetown Prep, a Jesuit boarding school in Rockville, Maryland as a sophomore. Kelly ranks among a list of distinguished Georgetown Prep alumni that includes Supreme Court Justices Neil Gorsuch and Brett Kavanaugh. It was during high school when Kelly began to sharpen his skills as a golfer.

Returning home to Minnesota for college, Kelly attended the University of Minnesota's Carlson School of Business and became a walk-on member of the men's golf team. By the end of first semester, Kelly had a full golf scholarship. He later earned the MVP award and was named Team Captain by senior year.

The Catholic faith instilled in him by his parents remained with Kelly through college.

"I would always go to Sunday evening Mass at the university parish after a weekend golf tournament," Kelly recalls. "But faith did not inform all of my choices at that time. There were inconsistencies in my life and faith."

Upon graduation in 1996 with a degree in Finance, Kelly qualified for the Professional

Golf Tour in Canada and South Africa where he competed against some of the world's top golfers.

"It did not go very well," Kelly recalls with humor. "A local reporter once described my game on the Canadian Tour, 'As Kelly went north, his game went south.' God very clearly closed that door for me. I am glad because I would not have been mature enough to handle that kind of success."

Two and a half years later, Kelly left the golf tour and returned to his high school *alma mater* to work as a prefect. From there he joined an investment banking firm in Baltimore and then Piper Jaffray in Minneapolis, giving him the opportunity to live closer to home. After four years, the world of finance called him back to the East Coast once again where Kelly says, "The insanity of New York woke me up, and I realized I was at a crossroads."

#### The Road to Ordination

In a 2011 interview with the *Catholic Spirit* prior to his ordination, Kelly looked back on his experiences in the finance industry with gratitude and recognized that time as a turning point on his journey to the priesthood:

"I liked what I did and had the fortune of working with people of great integrity," he told the *Spirit*. "But I felt a sense of growing unfulfillment in the work. So, I started asking deeper questions."

Kelly regularly attended Mass at Our Lady of Czestochowa in Jersey City where he got to know the pastor, Father Tom Iwanowski. Through Father Tom's encouragement, Kelly


registered in the parish, joined the finance council, and got involved in other parish activities. "The seeds were being planted," he said.

In 2004, Kelly's brother, Joseph, invited him to go on a five-day retreat in Croatia. There he met for the first time Father Michael Becker, then-pastor of St. Michael Catholic Church in St. Michael, Minnesota.

"The retreat was a powerful experience," Kelly recalled. "I was 30 years old, and I experienced the peace of Jesus, the peace that the world does not give. I knew He had to be the foundation of my life."

Kelly left his job in New York, moved back to the Twin Cities, and began to consider the priesthood. He spent the summer living at a rectory with Father Becker and three other members of the Companions of Christ, a fraternity of priests and seminarians in the Archdiocese of Saint Paul and Minneapolis. His time with them confirmed his decision to pursue the priesthood, and he entered The Saint Paul Seminary in the fall of 2005.

One of the most pivotal players in Kelly's ordination story, in addition to his parents, his brother and Father Iwanowski, is Father Becker: "From the beginning, I knew Father Becker was alive and fulfilled and he invited me into that kind of life as a priest."



#### **Priestly Ministry Begins**

Six years later, Father Jon Kelly was ordained on May 28, 2011. He asked Father Becker to vest him during the Mass.

Kelly was assigned to All Saints Catholic Church and School in Lakeville under the prayerful and dynamic leadership of Father Tom Wilson.

"For three years I lived a beautiful, broad experience of parish life," Kelly said. "I was able to minister through all of the sacraments - from baptism to anointing of the sick and the funeral Mass. I was privileged to participate in many 'story-of-a-soul' experiences."

In 2014, Father Kelly was assigned to serve as Formator and Spiritual Director at SJV where Father Becker was serving as Rector. Their personal and spiritual relationship, firmly rooted in the Lord, set the stage for

their professional relationship at the college seminary: "Father Becker and I had already built our relationship on what was most important. We could seamlessly transition this into our life and work at SJV."

Father Kelly was excited to work with undergraduate men discerning a call to the priesthood. "So much in life is timing," he said. "I can think of other priests who would be great in this role, but the most important question is not who is the best candidate, but rather who is God calling to do the work. When I got the call, I had confidence that God would bring out the needed capacities for whatever He was calling me to do."

#### A Vision for SJV

Like his mentor, Father Kelly became a member of the Companions of Christ in 2010 and models this way of living at SJV. Praying, working, and sharing the rhythm of life with the same cohort of priests and seminarians allows him to go deep which fits his personality and makes space for meaningful formation.

"Authentic Christian community and strong priestly fraternity are so important for our seminary," he adds. "And we enjoy each other. I want to give us space for creativity and even healthy conflict, which, if we are committed to seeking God every day in prayer, will always be resolved. My hope is that this example blesses the whole seminary."

Recently Father Kelly gave the keynote presentation during a virtual Vianney Visit for prospective seminarians and their Vocations Directors. Entitled "Come Follow Me," he explained it to the young men this way:

"Seminary life is not a 9-to-5 invitation. Rather, it is a call to live in community where home and school are one and formation permeates the environment. It is a meal together, a floor meeting, a moment to throw the frisbee or the football, or a spontaneous conversation in the hallway."

Father Kelly is also focused on building upon a solid program of formation begun by Father Becker and his predecessors, one that responds to the needs of today's seminarians.

"Our high school and college men are in a different place today than their counterparts were five to 10 years ago," he said. "Technology, secularization, and family dynamics present

more and more challenges. We are sensitive to that and yet we embrace the fact that God has chosen us to live in such a time as this."

Also recognizing that significant cognitive development takes place between the ages of 18 and 24, SJV sits at the nexus of where a young man is discerning the priesthood or married life. Father Kelly believes that human formation is critical for success and the very place where priest mentors can make the greatest impact. Drawing upon the wisdom of the university's patron saint, "St. Thomas Aquinas said that grace elevates and perfects nature. We want to

create the best environment for a young man to attain self-awareness so that he can make a gift of himself in service and love."


To enhance his own gifts of formation, Father Kelly has earned certificates in Spiritual Direction and Seminary Formation at the Institute for Priestly Formation (IPF) in Omaha, Nebraska, and the Seminary Formation Council in Boynton Beach, Florida. He has also served as a Formator and Adjunct Faculty during the summer programs of the IPF for priests and seminarians.

Another goal of Father Kelly's is to translate these skills into contemplative leadership at SJV. "The first line of my job description is to be the leader and spiritual father of the seminary," Kelly says. "I love that! It is such an honor for me to walk with these courageous young men. I am humbled and thrilled for the opportunity to encourage them to not be afraid and to form them to be Men in Christ, Men of the Church, and Men for Others."

#### Describe your experience at SJV.

**Father Thelen:** It took a lot for me to break up with the girl of my dreams and sign up for college seminary. Any nervousness was easily dispelled the first week I arrived. The atmosphere of joy and the encouragement I discovered at SJV made growing in holiness and in love with God seem effortless at times. My years at SJV turned out to be some of the most memorable and formative of my life.

#### Describe your formation at SJV.

**Father Thelen:** I thank God for the compelling witness and genuine spiritual fatherhood of the priest faculty. I was so moved by the formation at SJV that a dream of my priesthood was to be on faculty at a seminary. God fulfilled this dream when I joined the faculty at Sacred Heart Major Seminary in Detroit in 2014.

#### Did you recognize your spiritual gifts at SJV?

**Father Thelen:** My Rector, Father Bill Baer, named and called out the spiritual gifts he saw in me and shared with me about the work of the Holy Spirit in the life of the Church. I can honestly say that his personal investment around the gifts of the Spirit changed the direction of my life.

In January, the SJV community mourned the loss of alumnus Bailey Lauret from the Diocese of Sioux Falls. To all who knew him, Bailey lived as a man of Christ, a man of the Church, and a man for others.
